- · Education and statistics
- · Public health initiatives
- Early intervention and prevention
- · Investigation and enforcement

What is a Prescription Drug Monitoring Program?

- Collects controlled substance prescription records from dispensers state-wide
- Provides prescription histories and other compiled data to authorized end-users for use in clinical care, law enforcement, professional practice regulation, research and evaluation


- Enrollment conditions
- Query conditions
- · Data submission intervals
- · Use of delegates
- Proactive analysis of unsolicited reports
- · Interstate data sharing
- Data evaluation


PDMP Comparison


- 24 capture patient identification
- 46 capture method of payment
- 50 collect data less than 7 days
- 11 have HIE integration
- 46 allow unsolicited reports/alerts
- 28 have mandatory enrollment
- 32 have mandatory utilization
- · 47 allow delegate access
- · 37 engage in interstate data sharing


Recommended PDMP Best Practices

- · Collect positive identification of patient
- Collect data on method of payment
- · Collect data in timely intervals
- Integrate PDMP reports with HIEs/EHRs
- Send unsolicited reports/alerts to appropriate
 users
- Mandate enrollment and utilization
- Allow delegate access
- Enact and implement interstate data sharing
- · Stable funding









Florida's Successes

- Increased dispenser reporting
- Increased prescriber enrollment and utilization
- Reduced morphine milligram equivalent dosing prescribed
- Reduced the number of individuals having multiple provider episodes
