The Response

- 3/07 HJR23: Creation of Autism Task Force (Chaired by Rep. Cam Ward)
- 5/08 HJR3: Creation of Alabama Interagency Autism Coordinating Council (AIACC) and Coordinator (Secured with HB41 in April 2009)
- 6/08 Needs Assessment Completed
- 5/09 HB615: Creation of Regional Centers legislated (when funding is available)

Alabama Interagency Autism Coordinating Council: The Charge

- The AIACC is charged with meeting the urgent and substantial need to develop and implement a:
 - Statewide, comprehensive, coordinated, multidisciplinary, and interagency system of care for individuals with Autism Spectrum Disorder (ASD) and their families

Alabama Interagency Autism Coordinating Council: The Mission Statement

The AIACC guides a collaborative effort to facilitate a lifelong system of care and support for persons and their families with ASD or associated conditions, so that they may enjoy a meaningful and successful life.

Using ADDM Data

- Educating lawmakers

 - What practices/policies/procedures contribute to late diagnosis and intervention?

Using ADDM Data

- -Does service eligibility play a part in diagnoses?
 - Service eligibility is not based on ASD diagnosis, but rather level of functioning and IQ for some services
- What is needed to improve early identification and intervention? (training, funding, insurance reimbursement, etc.)

- 2012 Insurance coverage expanded
- 2014 BCBA Licensure Board created

AIACC Role / Focus

- Role of AIACC to guide development of a system of care for ASD
- Purpose of Regional Network non-residential resource and training services
- Objective is to move these two activities forward simultaneously
