Millions of Americans suffer from heart failure. Though the term sounds frightening, the actual condition, while serious. simply means the heart isn't pumping blood through the body efficiently. If the signs of heart failure are recognized early enough, a proper treatment regimen can be put in place to help improve the prognosis in acute events and reduce effects the condition has on other parts of the body. Program faculty will discuss heart failure and the signs and symptoms to be aware of in your home care patients.
