Zika is caused by a virus transmitted by infected Aedes mosquitoes. There is no specific treatment or vaccine currently available, and the best form of prevention is protection against mosquito bites, especially during pregnancy. Zika virus during pregnancy can lead to a pattern of conditions in the baby called congenital Zika syndrome. Program faculty will provide the latest details on Zika virus specifically related to the care and management of infants and children with potential exposure to Zika virus.
