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Rights of Medication Administration

- Right patient
- · Right medication
- Right dose
- Right route
- Right time
- AND the right documentation, right reason for administration, right response to medication

Opportunities for Improvement

- Expired vaccine given
- Incorrect vaccine given
- Vaccine adverse reactions

Expired Vaccine Incidents

- 5 incidents with expired vaccines in the last year:
 - -3 incidents of vaccine expired by one or three days
 - -2 incidents of vaccines expired a month later

Suggested Solutions

- Assign a primary and a secondary person to be "vaccine coordinators"
- They should be responsible for receiving ordering the vaccine, inventory, rotating, and returning expired / spoiled vaccine
- Place names of the responsible persons on the refrigerator and room used to draw vaccine

Incorrect Vaccine Administration

- 6 incidents of incorrect vaccine administration in the last year
 - Child less than 4 years of age (YOA)
 received Kinrix which is approved for
 4 YOA
 - Tdap given instead of Meningococcal
 - MMR given instead of Varicella
 - Child received 2 vaccines, 1 combination vaccine, with the same antigen

Medical Follow up

- Child < 1 YOA received MMR and Varicella
 - Mother contacted weekly until the
 21 days passed to check for rash,
 vesicles and fever
 - Instructed to contact primary physician for any problems
 - -Vaccines will not be counted

Suggested Solutions

- Post the "rights of medication" on the room wall for vaccine storage, preparing vaccines, and clinic room
- Place all vaccine duties on responsible staffs' R&R's to ensure compliance

Additional Suggested Solutions

- Review the ACIP Schedule and verify age to determine vaccines needed
- Print ImmPRINT Vaccine Forecaster for nurse (RN) to review
- Include these job duties on the staff's R
 & R's to ensure compliance
- Post Pink Book, Appendix B, U.S.
 Vaccine Tables 1 and 2, where vaccines is prepared

CHD Suggestions

- Some CHDs keep similarly packaged vaccines in a large bags or bins with a mailing label with vaccine and fund
 - Places bags or bins apart in refrigerator
- Put stickers on refrigerator with vaccine funding explanations

Adverse Reactions

- 7 incidents of adverse events in the last year
 - Two Arthus type reactions from Tdap (pruritis, swelling, firm nodule, erythema)
 - Four adverse events of syncope, dizziness, fainting, and fever (Vaccines: HPV, MCV, Tdap and Hep B.)
 - One possible event had to do with a swollen eye (Vaccines: Hep B and Tdap)

Suggestions

- Review all available health / immunization data prior to seeing patient, including Vaccine Forecaster
- Check daily the emergency response kit and keep in readily accessible place
- Follow nursing protocol for adverse reactions / anaphylaxis

Reporting Notifiable Diseases

- All CHD staff, including those answering the front desk for phones must understand which diseases are notifiable, who should report, how to report, when to report

Reporting Notifiable Diseases

- Based on Administrative Code, 420-4-1, all MDs and RNs must report the disease when made aware
 - They should not assume anotherMD, RN, or lab has made the report

Reporting Notifiable Diseases

- To report a 5-day Standard VPD, complete VPD REPORT Card
