
Today's rural communities are not immune from many of the problems of urban areas, including HIV/AIDS. Southern US states in particular have experienced a faster increase in HIV prevalence than other regions. Studies have shown rural residents face social, infrastructure, and geographical barriers that impact HIV prevention and care.
