

Powerful Stories: Julie and Katie Beckett

- Katie spent the first three years of life in a pediatric intensive care unit
- Her mom Julie pushed for reform and after six years Congress passed TEFRA, the Tax Equity and Fiscal Responsibility Act of 1982
 - Home and community-based waiver program

Powerful Stories: Julie and Katie Beckett

 Allows kids who would be institutionalized to be treated at home by keeping them eligible for Medicaid

Powerful Stories: Fran Porter

- Founded first Parent-to-Parent program in the U.S.
 - Allows parents of children with disabilities to share information and emotional support with others through a one-on-one match

Powerful Stories: Rud and Ann Turnbull

- Co-founded The Beach Center on
 Disability
 - Permanent unit of the University of Kansas
 - Affiliated with the Schiefelbusch Institute for Life Span Studies and the Department of Special Education

People First Language

- Use
 - People with disabilities
 - People without disabilities
 - -People with intellectual disabilities
 - A person who has autism
 - -He/she has an intellectual disability
 - -People with mental illness

People First Language

- Person who is deaf hearing impaired
- Accessible bathrooms; reserved parking
- Person who is blind visually impaired

People First Language

- Instead of
 - The Handicapped or disabled
 - -Normal people
 - -Autistic
 - -Has a birth defect, is crippled
 - -Crazy
 - -The deaf

People First Language

- Handicapped bathrooms, handicapped parking
- -The blind

 - -Resolution, key theme, impact/ask




- Simple, clear, and concise

- Crying


Speed Storying: Your Turn
