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SAIL Services Homebound Program

- Purpose
 - To enable individuals with severe traumatic brain injury and/or quadriplegia due to spinal cord injury to remain in their own homes

Funding

- 100% State Funding (General Fund/Special Education Trust Fund)
- Additional funding through Alabama Impaired Driver's Trust Fund
- Level funding since 1984
- Approximately 700 participants served yearly

SAIL Homebound Staff

- Staff in seven regional offices include
 - Rehabilitation Counselor
 - Registered Nurse
 - Administrative Assistant

Referral Process

 Referrals can be made directly to counselor or nurse by telephone, memo, or letter

Eligibilty Criteria

- · Individual has a significant medical disability, and
- · Resides in their own home, and
- Is dependent on others for the following activities of daily life
- Bowel and/or bladder
- Bathing self
- Feeding self
- Dressing self
- Preparing all meals
- Taking medications
- Checking for skin
- Transferring from
- integrity
- bed to chair

Eligibility Criteria

Has insufficient income/resources to

meet the cost of SAIL Homebound

· Is under the care of a responsible person who is free for employment,

Would require institutionalization

· Is a resident of the state of Alabama

Services

without SAIL Homebound, and

· 16 years of age or older

services, and

- · Guidance and counseling
- · Skilled nursing management
- Limited attendant care
- · Medical equipment
- Medical supplies
- Medication
- · Limited home modifications for accessibility

SAIL Homebound is not an entitlement program

Services are based on need and availability of funds

SAIL Services Medicaid Waiver Program

- Purpose
 - To provide services which allow severely disabled individuals to remain in their home and community instead of residing in a long-term care facility

Funding

 State funds are expended with 70% reimbursement from the Alabama Medicaid Agency

Staffing

 Rehabilitation Counselors and Registered Nurses are certified Case Managers for the SAIL Waiver program and are located in the seven regional offices

Eligibility Criteria

- · 18 years of age or older
- · Resident of the State of Alabama
- Onset of Medical condition must be prior to age 60 (and not associated with aging)
- Medically eligible as determined by medicaid

Eligibility Criteria

- Financially eligible as determined by Medicaid
- · Restricted in activities of daily living
- Final SAIL Waiver eligibility is determined by the Alabama Medicaid Agency

Referral Process

 Referrals can be made directly to case managers by telephone, memo, or letter.

Services

- · Case management
- Personal care (a limited amount)
- Medical Supplies (a limited amount)
- Assistive Technology (a lifetime cap)
- Environmental Accessibility Adaptation (a lifetime cap)
- Personal Emergency Response System (PERS)
- Personal Assistant Services

SAIL Services Independent Living Support Program

- PURPOSE
 - A federally funded program
 designed to assist eligible
 individuals with severe disabilities
 in living as independently as
 possible

Funding

- 100% Federal Funds
- Is NOT FUNDED through the Impaired Driver's Trust Fund

Staffing

 Independent Living Specialists are located in the seven regional offices

Eligibility Criteria

- Evidence of a severe disability
 not limited to TBI/SCI
- Limited in their ability to live independently
- Expected to improve their ability to live independently following provision of services

Referrals

 Referrals can be made directly to the independent living specialist. A referral form is available through the independent living specialist

Services Provided

- Advocacy
- Information and Referral
- Peer Support
- · Independent Living Skills Training

Olmstead Decision 1999

 On June 22, 1999, the United States Supreme Court held in Olmstead v. L.C. that the unnecessary segregation of individuals with disabilities in institutions may constitute discrimination based on disability

Olmstead Decision 1999

 The court ruled that the Americans with Disabilities Act may require states to provide community-based services rather than institutional placements for individuals with disabilities

Olmstead Decision 1999

 In a 6-3 opinion written by Justice Ruth Bader Ginsburg, the court affirmed a ruling by the United States Court of Appeals for the Eleventh Circuit, saying that,

"Unjustified isolation of individuals with disabilities is properly regarded as discrimination based on disability."

MOCCE

- Barriers
 - Fear of losing benefits
 - Disability too severe
 - Need for retraining
 - Transportation
 - -Lack of jobs in rural areas
 - Disability related health issues
