exually Transmitted Diseases (STDs) are hidden epidemics of tremendous health and economic consequence in the United States. They are hidden from public view because many Americans are reluctant to address sexual health issues in an open way and because of the biological and social factors associated with these diseases. Approximately 12 million new cases of STDs occur annually. STDs represent a growing threat to the nation's health and national action is urgently needed.

Among these STDs, the number of HIV/AIDS cases in Alabama rose dramatically in the 1980s, and has since peaked in the mid-1990s, with approximately 1,100 cases reported annually between 1995 and 1997. While HIV/AIDS cases have been reported all over Alabama, infection rates in southern Alabama are about twice those in the northern part of the state.

As the home care industry has grown and expanded, the need for a planned, organized approach to caring for the home care patient who is living with HIV or AIDS has become increasingly important. Home Health Aides and Home Attendants provide a wide range of care to patients and as caregivers be aware of their special needs.
