
### **Benefits of Poison Centers**

- Reduce unnecessary ED visits for poison/ drug exposures
- Assist in improving care for poisoned victims
- Education
- · Risk communication
- Assist in public health preparedness and disaster response
- · Cost savings

#### **Cost Effectiveness**

Every \$1 spent on poison centers saves the health care system \$7 (1997).

#### **Poison Center Financial Value**



Comparison of Financial Expenses and Savings Attributable to Poison Centers, US, 2005

\$26M - direct Federal contribution, \$74M - other sources (IOM)

Savings:
\$993M - reduced length of stay for
poisonings attributable to Poison
Center assistance
\$653M - cost avoidance from
reduction of ED visits by prehospital
management of poison exposures by
Poison Centers

#### Poison Centers Reduce Pediatric ED Visits

Of parents who did not call the poison center,
44% went to an emergency room whereas less than 1% of parents who called the poison center went to a hospital (P <0.001)


### **Potential Future Roles**

- Risk communication in a wide range of disasters:
  - Biological threats and emerging infections
  - Radiological
  - Chemical releases
  - Natural disasters

#### **Potential Roles**

- · Risk Communication
- Phone triage and referral of concerned patients
- Surveillance of other non-chemically related public health events
- Surveillance of adverse effects of medications that may be used in different types of illnesses
  - Some of these medications may have limited safety track record
