





- · Breastfeeding saves money






# Breastfeeding Has Benefits For Adults Too

- Type 2 diabetes occurs at higher rates in American Indian/Alaska Native communities than the general population
- Type 2 diabetes occurs less in adults who were breastfed


#### **Breastfeeding Reduces Risk** Of Diabetes Prevalence of Among Pima **Diabetes** Indians being BF 50% > 2 months 40% 30% 30% related to less 20% 20% risk for 10% developing diabetes by 40 years of age


# Mothers Who Breastfeed Have Less Risk Of Type 2 Diabetes


 A recent study of over 250,000 nurses showed that for every year of breastfeeding moms have 15% less risk of type 2 diabetes



# What barriers are still present?

### How will the law be enforced?

- Department of Personnel Management will write the worksite breastfeeding policy
- Department of Justice will work in partnership to make the process work; hear grievances of employees
- Navajo Nation Labor Commission is authorized to conduct hearings involving allegations of violations of the Act.
- Office of Navajo Labor Relations will monitor & enforce compliance in accordance to the Navajo Preference in Employment Act

# 2000 U.S. Census

- The population of the Navajo Nation is 180,462 with a median age of 24.0 years
- Among Navajo families, 42.9% live below the poverty level, with an average annual per capita income of \$7,269
