#### WIC:

Women, Infants and Children (WIC) is a supplemental nutrition program for pregnant women, breastfeeding women, women who had a baby within the last six months, infants, and children under the age of five. One must meet income requirements and have a nutritional risk that proper nutrition could help to improve.

#### Does your patient qualify for WIC?

- meet [income guidelines](#);
- be a resident of Alabama; and
- be seen by a health professional at the WIC clinic.

#### Income Eligibility Guidelines

(Effective from April 14, 2014 to June 30, 2015)

The guidelines below are based on WIC applicants' gross income before taxes are withheld.

**Our Home Health accepts Medicare, Medicaid, Blue Cross / Blue Shield, & Private Pay!**

**We also have Biomonitoring available! Biomonitoring is an in home monitoring program between USA and the Alabama Department of Public Health.**

**Biomonitoring helps ensure better health and compliance for your patients.**

**Patient must have Patient 1<sup>st</sup> Medicaid and a diagnosis of congestive heart failure, diabetes, &/or hypertension. We provide blood pressure cuffs and scales to those who enroll in this program.**



The Alabama Breast and Cervical Cancer Early Detection Program (ABCCEDP) provides free breast and cervical cancer screenings for women who meet eligibility guidelines. Free services include a pelvic exam, pap smear, clinical breast exam, mammogram, and diagnostic services such as an ultrasound, colposcopy, or biopsy, if needed.

**Eligibility Guidelines for Free Services**

- Women ages 40 to 64
- Women who have an income at or below 200% of the federal poverty guidelines - [2014 Income Eligibility Guidelines](#)
  - Women without insurance or who are underinsured
  - 2014 Income Eligibility Guidelines
  - (Effective February 1, 2014, until revised)
  - At or below 200% of the Federal Poverty Level determines program eligibility.
  - Household Size Annual Monthly
  - 1 \$23,340 \$1,945
  - 2 \$31,460 \$2,622
  - 3 \$39,580 \$3,298
  - 4 \$47,700 \$3,975
  - 5 \$55,820 \$4,652
  - 6 \$63,940 \$5,328
  - 7 \$72,060 \$6,005
  - 8 \$80,180 \$6,682
  - Each additional household member add \$8,120 annual or \$677 monthly.
  - \*Based on DHHS Poverty Guidelines issued 1/2014.

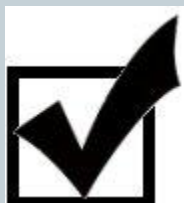
