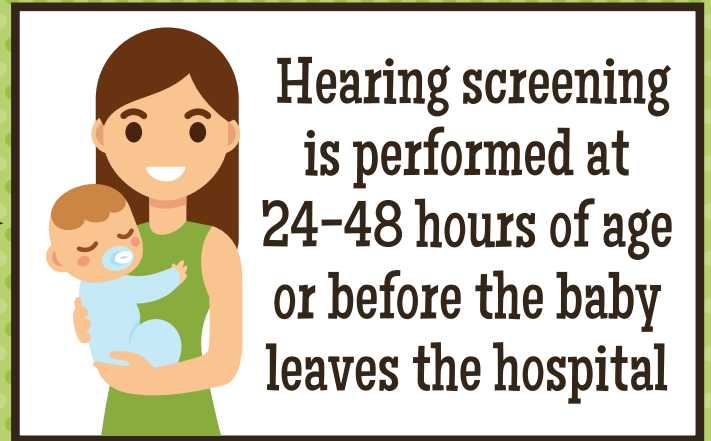


PARENT INFORMATION

Newborn Hearing Screening: What do the results mean?



Ask for your baby's
hearing results
before leaving the
hospital:



PASS
no further testing
required (always
monitor for speech and
language milestones)



**PASS WITH
RISK FACTORS**
further testing
recommended between
24-36 months of age



DID NOT PASS
The hospital should re-screen
your baby one more time or make
you an appointment for a hearing
re-screen (does not mean your
baby has hearing loss)

Did Not Pass:

- Schedule follow-up testing with an audiologist (hearing professional) within 2-3 weeks after you go home from the hospital.
- Ask your baby's doctor to help you find an audiologist or you can visit www.ehdi-pals.org
- Remember that just because a baby may respond to noise does not mean he or she can hear properly

- Infants who did not pass an automated auditory brainstem response (AABR) hearing screen must have a repeat AABR for follow-up screening
 - Both ears should be tested with each screening even if only one ear did not pass
 - No more than two valid initial screening attempts should be performed

NEWBORN HEARING SCREENING FACTS:



Each year,
12,000
infants are born deaf
or hard of hearing.

HEARING LOSS
is one of the
MOST COMMON
birth defects.

Newborns should be
screened for hearing
loss **BEFORE LEAVING**
THE HOSPITAL.

If left undetected, a hearing loss can delay
a **CHILD'S SPEECH AND LANGUAGE**
DEVELOPMENT, as well as **THINKING,**
LEARNING, and SOCIAL SKILLS.
