Alabama Breast and Cervical Cancer Early Detection Program (ABCCEDP)

National Program Overview

- Established by Centers for Disease Control and Prevention in 1991
 - Provides low-income, uninsured, and underserved women access to timely, high-quality screening and diagnostic services, to detect breast and cervical cancer at the earliest stages

State Program Overview

- Alabama program funded in 1996
- Provides free breast and cervical cancer screening to underserved women
 - -At or below 200% of poverty level
 - -No insurance or underinsured

CDC Core Age Groups: Breast Screening

- 50 64 years of age
 - -75% of funds must serve this age group
- 40 49 years of age
 - Permitted, but not possible without private funds

CDC Core Age Groups: Breast Screening

- · Under 40 years of age
 - -Permitted if have breast complaint
 - -Not possible without private funds

CDC Core Age Groups: Cervical Screening

- 40 64 years of age
 - -20% of funds must serve never or rarely screened
 - Rarely screened = not screened in past 5 years
- Under 40 years of age
 - -Not possible without private funds

Current Eligibility

- Effective February 7, 2011
- 40 64 abnormal clinical breast exam
- 50 64 never had mammogram
- 50 64 haven't had Pap smear in 5 or more years

Breast Screening

- · Clinical breast exams
- Mammograms
- Diagnostic testing if abnormality is found
- Eligible for Medicaid if diagnosed with cancer

Cervical Cancer Screening

- Pelvic exam
- Pap smear
- Diagnostic testing if abnormality is found
- Eligible for Medicaid if diagnosed with pre-invasive or invasive cervical cancer

Service Provision

- · County health departments
- Contracts with 400+ providers
 - Primary care providers
 - Gynecologists
 - Radiologists
 - Mammogram facilities
 - -Surgeons

ABCCEDP Women Served

- Since 1996
 - -76,135 women served
 - -1,416 diagnosed with breast cancer
 - -377 diagnosed with preinvasive/invasive cervical cancer

ABCCEDP Women Served

- 2010 grant year
 - -15,531 women served
 - -149 diagnosed with breast cancer
 - 21 diagnosed with preinvasive/invasive cervical cancer

Breast and Cervical Cancer Prevention Treatment Act

- 2000 Act gave states option to offer women in the NBCCEDP access to treatment through Medicaid
 - All states and DC approved this option
- 2001 American Indians and Alaska Natives added as eligible through their service providers

Breast and Cervical Cancer Prevention Treatment Act

2009 – Any woman who meets
 ABCCEDP criteria and is diagnosed with breast or cervical cancer is eligible for treatment thru Medicaid

Alabama Family Planning Program

- Established in 1970 by Title X of the Public Health Services Act
- Purpose
 - Provide access to contraceptive supplies and information to all who want and need them with priority to low income persons

Alabama Family Planning Program

- Mission
 - Help women and men plan their families, take care of their reproductive health, and prevent unintended pregnancies

Alabama's Program

- Promotes well-being of families, responsible behavior and healthy mothers and babies
- Prevents unintended pregnancy and abortion through education and contraceptive services allowing for personal planning and timing of pregnancies
- Provides services in 88 clinics

What Services Are Provided?

- An array of confidential, preventive health services including:
 - Contraceptive services
 - -Physical exams
 - -Pregnancy testing and counseling
 - -Breast and cervical cancer screening

What Services Are Provided?

- Screening for high blood pressure, anemia and diabetes
- -Screening for STDs, including HIV
- -Basic infertility services
- Preconception counseling
- -Health education
- Adolescent counseling

What Services Are Provided?

- -Care coordination for some clients
- -Follow-up and referral as needed

Who Do We Serve?

- Men and women of reproductive age
- Services targeted to low income regardless of ability to pay
- 2010 caseload 105,053
 - -80% at or below 100% FPL
 - -90% say clinics regular source of health care

PLAN First

- Medicaid FP Waiver
 - -Women age 19 55
 - At or below 133% of FPL
 - Must live in Alabama and be a U.S. citizen

PLAN First

- -Expanded FP services to include care coordination
 - Provides enhanced education/support on appropriate use of chosen birth control method to ensure successful FP

Preconception Health

- Promote health of women throughout their reproductive years
 - -Reproductive life planning
 - -Goal
 - Improve birth outcomes, ensuring the health of women throughout their lives

Preconception Health

- Marketing Campaign (GAL)
 - Public education program for young women and men
 - Healthy choices early in life for a better future

Alabama WIC Program

- Supplemental food and nutrition education program for low income:
 - -Pregnant women
 - -Postpartum women
 - -Breastfeeding women and
 - -Infants and children up to age 5

Alabama WIC Program

 WIC seeks to empower people to make healthy nutritional choices for themselves and their family

WIC Funding

- Funded by the US Department of Agriculture (USDA)
- 100% federally funded program



Qualifications for WIC

- Alabama resident
- Meet income guidelines
 - Medicaid recipient
 - -SNAP (food stamps)
 - -TANF
- Have a nutritional need

WIC Services

- Supplemental nutritious foods such as milk, cereals, juice, cheese, eggs, whole wheat bread, brown rice, peanut butter, fresh fruits, fresh vegetables, infant formulas, and baby foods
- Individualized nutrition counseling
- · Immunization screenings

WIC Services

Referrals for health and social services as needed

WIC and Breastfeeding

- Provides support for breastfeeding mothers
- · Provides breastfeeding supplies
- Loans electric breast pumps
- Provides single user electric pumps to mothers returning to school or work

Defining Nutritional Need

- Underweight
- Inadequate growth development
- Overweight
- History of pregnancy complications
- Anemia
- Unhealthy nutritional practices
- Medical conditions
- Inadequate prenatal care

WIC Serves Many Working Poor Families in Alabama

 Approximately 144,000 participants receive WIC foods from 743 authorized grocery stores in Alabama

Long-Term Benefits of WIC

- Fewer premature births
- · Fewer low birth weight babies
- · Lower fetal and infant death rate
