Cornell Medical College Study – New York

- For every elder abuse case reported to a mandated enforcement agency, the survey found 24 unreported cases occurred
- For each case of financial abuse of elders reported to authorities, 44 actually occurred and 57 cases of neglect occurred

Victim Impact

- Bankrupt
 - Emotionally, physically, and spiritually
- · Loss of independence
- · Loss of assets
- · Health deterioration
- · Irreversible setback

Victim Impact

- · Fact:
 - Mortality rate is 3 times greater for an elderly victim

Quality of Health Impact

- · Increase in stress
 - -High blood pressure
 - -Anxiety, panic attacks
 - -Chest pains
 - -Worry, depression

Quality of Health Impact

- -Shame, guilt
- -Eat less, use medications, alcohol
- -Difficulty sleeping
- -Withdrawal

Consequences

- · Premature death
- Nursing home placement
- · Increase in emergency room visits
- Hospitalization
- · Hospice / home health
- · Quality of life
- Guardianship

Elder Justice and Advocacy Program

- Older American Act
 - -Title VII program

Elder Justice and Advocacy Program

- Serve as an information and referral conduit
- Establish "speakers bureau to train professionals"
- Establish a community volunteer program
- · Increase access to services

- Identify service/communication gaps between agencies
- Strengthen the current reporting systems

Council Goals and Objectives

- Increase the knowledge and skills of professionals
- Develop a statewide advocacy, education, and outreach campaign

Elder Financial Security

- Nearly 1/3 of people aged 60+ are economically insecure (36%)
 - -1 of every 3
- 1/3 of senior households do not have ANY money left over each month
- 3/4 of seniors are financially vulnerable

Elder Financial Security

 77% of people over 65 depend on their Social Security for all or most of their monthly income

Access to Services

- Prescription drugs
- · Energy assistance
- Financial
- Legal
- · Health care
- · Social Security
- Housing

Access to Services

- In-home services
- Tax relief
- Transportation
- · Educational assistance
- Employment
- Volunteer services
- Supplemental Nutrition Assistance (SNAP / Food Stamps)

How Can You Help?

- Educate elders BEFORE they are targeted
- · Have an open and honest discussion
- · Use "real life" examples
- Report any suspect activity
- Encourage elders to take time making decisions
