

Prevent Cervical Cancer

with the Right Test at the Right Time

Screening tests can find abnormal cells so they can be treated before they turn into cancer.

- ① The Pap test looks for changes in ② The human papillomavirus (HPV) cells on the cervix that could turn into cancer if left untreated.
- test looks for the virus that causes these cell changes.

The only cancer the Pap test screens for is cervical.



HPV is the main cause of cervical cancer.

- HPV is α very common virus,
 Most people get it,
 If HPV doesn't passed from one person to another during sex.
 - but it usually goes away on its own.
- go away, it can cause cancer.

Most women don't need a Pap test every year!



Have your 1st Pap test when you're 21. If your test results are normal, you can wait 3 years for your next Pap test.

HPV tests aren't recommended for screening women under 30.


When you turn **30** you have a choice: If your test results are normal, get a Pap test every 3 years **OR** get both a Pap test and an HPV test every 5 years.

You can stop getting screened if:

- than 65 and have had normal Pap test results for many years.
- (A) You're older (A) Your cervix was removed during surgery for a non-cancerous condition like fibroids.
