Roles

- ▲ ADPH is the lead agency in Emergency Support Function (ESF) 8 and the support agency for healthcare organizations that provide direct patient care in an emergency response. Each of the 11 public health areas has an emergency preparedness team devoted to preparedness planning. Team members include some combination of the following roles:
 - Emergency Preparedness Coordinator
 - Environmentalist
 - Surveillance Nurse
 - Administrative Support Assistant




Emergency Support Function 8 Health and Medical

All Events Are Local

- When the capacity of the locals is reached, they reach out to the state partners.
- When the capacity of the state is reached, it reaches out to the federal partners.
- State and federal partners assist and support the local government in managing and responding to the event.

CEP Responsibilities

♦ The Center for Emergency Preparedness (CEP) coordinates Alabama's health, medical, and social services in the event of public health threats and emergencies. Under the state Emergency Operations Plan, ESF 8 includes all medical aspects of an emergency response.





AIMS

- ♦ Tracks resources at facilities including staff and supplies.
- ♦ Allows for immediate requests for assistance or offers of assistance.





Five Levels of Care Outside the Home

- 1. Mass Care Shelters
- 2. Comfort Care Shelters
- 3. Medical Needs Shelters
- 4. Alternative Care Sites
- 5. Hospitals

Mass Care Shelters

- Operated by the Alabama Department of Human Resources under ESF-6 –Sheltering in cooperation with Red Cross and other partners.
- ♦ ADPH may have nurses present on a limited basis.

Comfort Care Centers

- Sponsored by ADPH
- Managed, Operated and Staffed by local Faith-based or Civic Organizations
- Provides home level care in a shelter environment.
- For those who could be cared for at home if they had someone there to provide care
- ♦ Care will consist of comfort measures including over-thecounter medications

Medical Needs Shelters



MISSION

The mission of a Medical Needs Shelter is to provide a shelter of last resort during emergency conditions for persons with conditions requiring medical/nursing oversight and who cannot be accommodated in a general population shelter. The MNS *is* housed in a *secure* facility with sustainable power, water, sanitation, and limited food service.

A "Secure" facility is:

- 1. Structurally appropriate
- 2. Staffed by security personnel
- 3. Not in mandatory evacuation zone or high risk area

Who Will Be Seeking Care in the Medical Needs Shelter?

- ▶ People with minor health/medical conditions who require professional observation, assessment, and maintenance but who do not require institutional care.
- People with chronic stable conditions who may require assistance with the activities of daily living but who do not require institutional care.

Alternative Care Sites

- Sponsored, Managed, Operated, Staffed and supplied by hospitals in non traditional settings
- These shelters will provide sub hospital care when hospitals are completely filled.
- ♦ The Joint Commission requires all accredited hospitals to have a Alternative Care Site Plan.

Hosptials

- Traditional hospital care
- Altered standards of care may be in place during emergency events when the hospitals capacity and capability is taxed by unusually large numbers or acuity of patients.









Timeline of Event

- ◆ April 20, 2010 Explosion aboard Deepwater Horizon 11 lives lost, 17 injured
- ♦ April 22, 2010 Deepwater Horizon sinks into Gulf of Mexico
- ♦ April 28, 2010 BP named as the responsible party by U.S. Coast Guard
- ♦ April 30, 2010 Incident Command centers activated in Houma, LA, and Mobile, AL (ADPH staffs ESF-8 desk)



Role of ADPH Staff

- Public Health Unit within the planning section of Unified Command
- Subject Matter Experts participating in daily teleconferences
- Joint Information Center
- State EOC
- Providing detailed reports to Dr. Williamson, State Health Officer
- Local support on the coast plus town hall meeting coordination



Severe Weather Outbreak April 27, 2011 Situation Report #1 April 27, 2011 2:00 PM Background

- •Wednesday April 27, 2011
 - o The Alabama Emergency Management Agency (AEMA) activated at Level 1.
 - o The ADPH External Liaison to Clanton, AL (EOC).
 - o Governor Robert Bentley declared a "state of emergency."
 - o Six deaths initially reported as a result of the weather.






Severe Weather Outbreak April 27, 2011 Situation Report #2 April 28, 2011 8:30 P.M. Background

- •Thursday April 28, 2011
 - oSeveral counties in Alabama were affected by tornadoes Wednesday night.
 - oAEMA confirmed 185 deaths, 655 injuries, and 6 missing persons statewide.
 - o Approximately 28 mass care shelters were opened across the state, including one shelter for families of decedents for social needs in Area 6.
 - oThere were no medical needs shelters open at this time.
 - oArea 1 staff members were deployed to Russellville Hospital to assist with triage and treatment Wednesday night.
 - o23 ambulances from Alabama and Mississippi were routed throughout the state.
 - oICS Chiefs meeting was held at 8:15 a.m.
 - oDeKalb County requested a morgue trailer.
 - oArea 2 may be without power for 7 days or more.
 - oMedical Needs Shelter in DeKalb County was established at Henagar School (Henagar, Alabama).
 - o Area 10 team notified to deploy Friday morning to Henagar School.








H1N1 Flu Response

Alabama H1N1Update Example

- Example Report:
- For 16 weeks, Alabama has elevated influenza-like illness (ILI) activity
 - ♦ 6.4% (high 12%) of doctor's offices (ADPH Surveillance)
 - 9.7% (high 20%) of emergency rooms (AIMS data)
 - ♦ 3.3% (high 5%) of hospital admissions
- ▲ Last week, 72 out of 100 specimens were + for H1N1
- ♦ Initially, 39 deaths due to H1N1

- Place your emergency supply kit to waterproof bags.
- Store the bags in one or two emergency containers, such as plastic tubs, unused trash cans or duffel bags.
- Store your kit where family members can locate it.
- Try to have enough food, liquid, batteries, and other supplies to last one to four weeks depending on the emergency.
