## US and Alabama Cancer Update: Cervical Cancer in Alabama

- Dr. Jennifer Young-Pierce, Gynecologic Oncologist, Leader of Cancer Control and Prevention, and Professor of Interdisciplinary Clinical Oncology at the University of South Alabama Mitchell Young Cancer Institute, provided the US and Alabama HPV Cancer Update. ## **National Update:**

- Dr. Shannon Stokley, Director, Acting Deputy Director, Immunization Services Division, National Center for Immunization and Respiratory Diseases (NCIRD), Centers for Disease Control and Prevention provided the National Adolescent Vaccination Update and discussed the following:

- Summary and Call to Action
  - HPV vaccination coverage continues to improve among adolescents.
  - Among adolescents living at or above the poverty level, those living in rural areas have lower HPV up to date coverage compared with those living in urban areas.
  - Coverage still threatened by the disruption of routine medical services due to the OCVID-19 pandemic. Limited opportunity to assess pandemic effects with 202 NIS-Teen data.
  - Now is the time for parents to schedule well teen visits so children can get needed vaccinations-catch up on missed doses and stay on schedule.
     Those aged 12+ eligible for a COVID-19 vaccination.

### **HPV Cancer Prevention- St. Jude's Call to Action:**

- Dr. Heather Brandt, Member St. Jude Faculty, HPV Cancer Prevention Program Director provided a pre-taped recording and discussed the following:

    - HPV vaccination is safe, effective and durable yet uptake is less than optimal. Low HPV vaccination uptake exists in areas where HPV associated disease burden is greatest. There is tremendous opportunity for impact.

Parental vaccine hesitancy threatens vaccination uptake.

### **Clinical Interventions**

- Start at age 9
  - Age at HPV vaccination matters
  - Earlier initiation of HPV vaccination at ages 9-10 has multiple benefits.
- Strong healthcare provider recommendation
  - Strong provider recommendations in supportive systems drive vaccination rates.
    - Use presumptive recommendations.
    - Nurses can use their expertise and influence to encourage vaccinations among adolescent populations.

    - History of cervical dysplasia post treatment
    - Any immunocompromised- diabetes, smoking, MS, RA, lupus, UC, Crohns, transplant, etc.
    - Environmental exposure to aerosolized HPV- ob-gyns, office staff, OR staff
